## METHODOLOGY & DEFINITION OF BATTLEGROUNDS

A battleground web poll of 1,000 registered voters was conducted July 22-26, 2021. The margin of error is +/- 3.5 percentage points.

# Web survey weighted to recent phone poll on cultural thermometers, and 2020 vote by white working class weighted to match Catalist analysis.

## METHODOLOGY – KEY WEIGHTING STEPS

**Weighting to phone polls:** The web survey requires a recent phone survey that includes core demographic and ideological questions, including key thermometer measures, and is used to compare and apply political and cultural weights to the web survey results to offset bias of online sample.

- We first applied standard gender, region, race and age weights to match Catalist counts for registered voters in this battleground.
- We then weighted white college/non-college to match proportions from the Catalist 2020 election analysis (44% white non-college, 28% white college).
- We often weight web surveys to match the short phone survey as needed on ideology, and vote or presidential job approval—**after first weighting the cultural thermometers to match our phone survey. In this web survey, we weighted cultural measures halfway to the recent phone poll to offset cultural bias.**
- Additionally, after cultural weights, the recalled 2020 vote was weighted within working class women and white working class men, to match to Catalist post-election analysis—**ensuring we have the correct share of white non college, and the real recalled 2020 vote for both men and women.**



## Building blocks:

- This first phase of the project for Democracy Corps, AFT and CVI suggests some striking new building blocks for constructing a strategy for Democrats running better with all working class voters.
- In this phase, Democracy Corps was concentrating on the white working class, EquisLabs on Hispanics and Latinos, and Hit Strategies on Blacks and Asian Americans, but the similarity of the responses of base and persuasion targets led us to throw out artificial barriers and be open to new building blocks.
- This poll started with Democrats having only a 2-point lead in the 2022 Senate and House battleground (unchanged from 2020) and Biden and the Democrats trailing Trump and the Republicans on the economy, making America safe, promoting hard work, handling immigration, crime, and China, yet ended up with Democrats surprisingly prevailing by 8-points. That happened even though these working class voters heard Trump's whole world view, as well as the attacks on Democrats on the police and crime, socialism and losing touch with working people. Why? What were the building blocks?

# Building blocks:

- **Building block one** — recognizing that the overwhelming majority of *both* our diverse base and persuadable voters are working class, that is, they have never completed a four-year college degree. Fully 68 percent of Blacks are working class, 67 percent of millennials and GenZ voters, 69 percent of unmarried women, and 57 percent of white unmarried women. What the CVI calls the New American Majority of Blacks, Hispanics and Asian Americans, millennials and Gen Z and unmarried women are two-thirds working class.
- **Building block two** — recognizing that both our diverse base and persuadable voters are living paycheck to paycheck, have very similar priorities for government and resent hardworking people no longer calling the shots in society and government. They both want government to offer more protections and higher pay for low-wage workers, and maintain the child tax credit, reduced health insurance premiums and prescription drug costs and better Medicare, and big corporations paying much more in taxes.
- **Building block three** — recognizing to motivate and persuade our base of Blacks, Hispanics, Asian Americans, millennials, and unmarried women, Democrats must help them get paid more by their employers, reduce their health care costs and help with the cost of raising kids and, and check the power of big corporations. Seven other initiatives rank higher for our base than addressing racial equities. Nonetheless, Democrats addressing them remains a moral imperative. Running on it serves Bannon and Trump, not our base. (This will be further assessed after research by EquisLabs and HIT Strategies.)



# Key Findings:

- **Building block four** — *making the new expanded, monthly child tax credit a centerpiece of the Democratic agenda because it is very popular and shows that white working class voters under 50 years of age (not the older working class) and white parents may be very accessible to Democrats.*
- When described as a tax cut for every working family to deal with the high cost of raising kids and taxes, this wins intense support in our base but even more with the white working class under 50 and parents. Even when attacked as producing “new welfare queens,” it retains support with these voters. That it would be repealed by a new Republican Congress; and raise taxes, it is one of the strongest attacks with the white working class under 50, white parents and our winnable voters.
- **Building block five** — recognizing that persons with a disability are heavily represented in the white working class and rural areas, as is evident in every focus group we conduct. It is time to see them, and this poll shows they can be the next unmarried women. VPC/CVI came to realize that nearly 60 percent of the white unmarried women were working class and were moved by affordable health care, help with getting an education, and limiting the role of big money, more than work and family issues. And they are now base voters. With further research, can persons with a disability become part of the base?

## Building blocks:

- **Building block six** — seeing that working people are much less likely to say they work at a plant or auto company, but are skilled independent contractors, own or work in a small business. So, our issue agenda included the PPP, grants for restaurants, and help for small businesses. Our message said, “we need a government that works for the middle class, working families, *small businesses* and the vulnerable that work hard.” Voters heard, Democrats fight for small businesses.
- **Building block seven** — prioritizing public safety, crime, with respect and funding for police, along with urgent reforms that bring better training and accountability— is a precondition for Democrats being successful in the midterms. The Democrat we tested said, “we must be for funding, not defunding the police” and “respect officers.” The Democrats are also unequivocal that abusive officers will be held accountable.
- The survey gave full voice to Trump’s view that “America has never been more at risk for those who made America Great. Crime in our Country is escalating at a pace we've never seen before. People are pouring through our Borders ... [And] we must act to save America and [that] means ensuring that we always keep America First. [We] teach the truth about our history, believe the men and women of law enforcement [and] respect our great American Flag.” But we move into an 8-point lead when voters hear we prioritize public safety and battle for the hard-working middle class, working families, small businesses and the vulnerable.










What is the last year of schooling that you have completed?

# Voters moved by impact of Biden-Democratic agenda, especially health care costs, taxing corporations, helping workers get higher pay, & child tax credit



**(MIN WAGE/LABOR PROTECTIONS)** Raised the minimum wage for federal contractors to \$15.00 an hour and are pushing to strengthen public and private sector unions and help all workers bargain successfully for wage increases and stop losses in salary, such as employers not paying overtime or forcing off-the-clock work.




**(PAID FAMILY LEAVE)** They have begun paid medical and family leave, rescued the child care industry with the raised \$3,000 child care tax credit that reduces child care expenses for a family by \$14,800.



**(CHILD TAX CREDIT)** Barring any tax increase for anyone earning under \$400,000, and its expanded child tax credit is a big middle class tax cut for families with kids earning up to \$150,000.




**(SYSTEMIC INEQUALITY)** For many decades, some government agencies didn't provide services to all citizens equally. Now, Black farmers are getting grants, millions of housing vouchers are targeted to minority communities, the infrastructure law removes all lead pipes, and there is increased funding for Black, tribally-controlled colleges, and Hispanic institutions.

# Strongest attacks on Republicans: McConnell's gridlock stopping Biden, half live paycheck to paycheck while corporations don't pay fair share & repeal CTC and raise taxes


**(GRIDLOCK)** Mitch McConnell said publicly, "One-hundred percent of our focus is on stopping this new Biden administration." Republicans winning control means total gridlock and nothing happening for people.

**(TRICKLE DOWN)** Republicans have told us that if we just cut taxes for the wealthy and corporations, working people will share in the prosperity. But half of our people live paycheck to paycheck. Trickle-down economics simply doesn't work, and it's time for corporations to finally pay their fair share in taxes.

**(BLOCK BIDEN - SCOTUS W/ROE) (SPLIT B)** Mitch McConnell said if Republicans control the Senate in the next election, it will block President Biden putting any justices on the Supreme Court for 2 years and that means overturning Roe v. Wade and the right to legal abortions.

















## Maybe most work as independent contractors, own or work in a small businesses, and so do their kids who have stayed; more work in hospitals than factories.

I am a hair stylist and I own my own private salon. Business has been affected but thank God, it's coming back. (PA woman, Trump voter)

I live with my husband in the Youngstown areas. We both quit our corporate positions to open a micro dairy and become goat farmers. [...] My issues are basically, I'm building a business, I haven't changed anything except wearing a mask in public when I have to. (OH woman, Trump voter)

I was the quality control and facilities manager for a manufacturing company, but I was laid off due to COVID. I try to do everything I can. I've been learning to be a better investor and running small business side gigs and getting a lot of home improvement done. (WI man, Trump voter)

In the long run it'll help everyone because the lower class is getting trade jobs. My husband is a plumber. Our whole lifeblood is built on the trades. I have two brothers-in-law who are electricians. Many of our friends are in the trade and it's hard work and you can make a living. By doing this, you're raising that whole group of people up. Then, they're getting to be at the level this whole other group is. Now you elevate a huge, huge group of people (PA woman, Biden voter)

In our area, I bookkeep on the side and he [her husband] happens to own a trucking company. A lot of paper mills are closed down and they need to get them rolling again because no one can afford to pay for this plywood and lumber. It's almost like they're setting us up for failure. (WI woman, Trump voter)

My husband is a plumber. Our whole lifeblood is built on the trades. I have two brothers-in-law who are electricians. Many of our friends are in the trade and it's hard work and you can make a living. (PA woman, Trump voter)


# Prioritizing crime, respect police, fund not defund combined with better training and accountability dominates Trump narrative on police and crime






# Democrats look out for middle class, working families, small businesses and vulnerable defeats the GOP by 4 points – double initial margin – but need more







# The team working so Democrats run stronger with all working class groups

## OUR RESEARCH TEAMS AND THEIR RESEARCH

- **Democracy Corps-** We fielded battleground web poll of 1,000 registered voters was conducted July 22-26, 2021, which was weighted to recent phone poll on cultural thermometers, and 2020 vote by white working class weighted to match Catalist analysis.
- **EquisLabs-** We used findings from focus groups conducted with Hispanic voters to inform this online survey of 1800 registered Hispanic registered voters in 11 states (Arizona, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Michigan, North Carolina, Nevada, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Texas and Wisconsin).
- **HIT Strategies-** Our research included findings from qualitative research with Black voters and previous research with AAPI voters to inform the quantitative findings in this report that are based on two surveys of AAPI and Black registered voters: the first survey used mixed mode of text-to-web and live phone dialing to survey 400 registered Asian and Pacific Islander voters in Orange County, CA and second online survey consisted of 1,200 African American registered voters in 10 battleground states (MI, WI, PA, GA, SC, NC, FL, TX, NV, AZ) matched to the voter file.

## Keys to winning all working class voters:

- **Key one** — recognizing that the overwhelming majority of our diverse base is the hardworking working class. They are citizens who have never completed a four-year college degree. Fully 70 percent of Blacks in HIT's battleground survey are working class, 75 percent in EquisLab's surveys with Hispanics in Florida, Texas, Arizona and other battleground states. The AAPI voters are predominantly college grads in Orange County, but 67 percent of millennials and GenZ voters lack a four-year degree, as do 69 percent of unmarried women, and 57 percent of white unmarried women across the 2022 battleground. We need to **wear** their working class shoes.
- **Key two** is recognizing that all our base of Black, Hispanics, and Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders are feeling less hopeful about the country's direction and giving Democrats a weaker generic congressional vote than expected because of uncertainty on COVID, the economy, and whether Biden in the end will make life better **for them**... And that may be decided this week.
- **Key three** is recognizing our base is pretty clear-eyed and united about Build Back priorities: labor protections that promote a \$15 wage and watch out for workers rights in the workplace; expanding Medicare or maintaining insurance subsidies that lower insurance premiums for the first time; the child tax credit; and infrastructure **jobs**. They **want material help** but also to strengthen workers and weaken big corporations who should pay their fair share of taxes.

## Keys to winning all working class voters:

- **Key four** is recognizing that campaigns to win these voters back must focus on a base that is consumed with material gains and class position, a base that prioritizes improving economic conditions of their communities within the context of racial disparity. AAPI voters put initiatives on racial equities at the bottom of their list, **as do Hispanics in Democracy Corps' research**. Racial justice is an important priority for Blacks in HIT's battleground research, but it is part of a top set of priorities that include greater labor protection, reduced health costs, infrastructure jobs, managing COVID, and the CTC.
- **Key five** is realizing that Democrats need to be showing, they care more about people like you and are are "better for Hispanics." Democrats need to talk about each Hispanic community, its immigrant and class history that bring them to America to fulfill the American dream. **Delivery on immigration in the Congress shows Democrats don't take them for granted, are indeed better for Hispanics and helps them with pro-immigration voters**. Democrats need to deliver in areas of Democratic strength: COVID, health care, immigration, and "caring for people like you." And hit the Republicans who govern only for the biggest corporations.
- **Key six** is recognizing that AAPI voters **are** pretty alienated, **believe country on wrong track, and Democrats are underperforming**. They resent other groups getting more attention, yet very aligned with Democrats on corporations paying higher tax and respond strongly to message, "need government that works for us."

- **Key seven** is recognizing *that both our diverse base and persuadable working class voters have very similar priorities for government* and they too, resent hardworking people no longer calling the shots in society and government. Our base and working class targets both want government to offer more protections and higher pay for low-wage workers, and maintain the child tax credit, reduced health insurance premiums and prescription drug costs and better Medicare, and big corporations paying much more in taxes.
- **Key eight** is recognizing this is an opportunity for Dems to pass legislation that lifts all working class boats but to advance messaging that describes how the new laws specifically addresses the needs of Black, Hispanic and Latino, AAPI and white working voters. It shows Democrats care about them, allays fear that some groups benefiting more than others and improves perception that “neither” party is delivering for them.
- **Key nine** is recognizing that crime is a major issue in every community and addressing it is a precondition for Democrats regaining support. Crime was among the very top concerns with AAPI and Black voters, where it ranks higher than police abuse. Trump’s message on respecting police still gets a strong hearing in all these communities. However, Democracy Corps research showed how much Democrats gained their biggest margin in an experiment where voters heard, “we must be for funding, not defunding the police” and “respect officers.” The Democrats are also unequivocal that abusive officers will be held accountable.

# Key Findings:

- **Key ten** is recognizing that persons with a disability are heavily represented in the white working class and rural areas, as is evident in every focus group we conducted. They respond with great enthusiasm to the current agenda and become more Democratic. Can they become base voters?
- **Key eleven** is recognizing that *making the new expanded, monthly child tax credit a centerpiece* of the Democratic agenda reveals new things about the the white working class. First, it is very popular, but also shows that white working class voters under 50 years of age may be culturally different than their parents and therefore more accessible to Democrats.
- **Key twelve** is recognizing the working class is really independent contractors, small business owners, and those who work in small businesses. Democrats need to have programs to help them, as well as be seen to battle for small businesses.
- **Key thirteen.** All of this research points to a common message frame where Democrats are on your side while Republicans fight for the rich corporations. [see next slide]

## **Working Messages:**

### **EquisLabs**

- Democrats say that those who work hard should be able to achieve the American Dream. Biden took over a divided Washington and acted quickly to deliver relief to working Americans and small businesses. Now, Democrats are cutting taxes for middle-class families, giving a boost to small businesses, and creating millions of good-paying jobs by investing in infrastructure. (Tested with Hispanic voters)
- Democrats say that Republicans are looking out for the wealthy instead of those struggling to pay their bills. It's time that corporations and the top one percent pay their fair share so we can invest in education, job-creating infrastructure, childcare, reduced health care costs, and lower taxes for working families. It's wrong that the rich have gotten richer while too many average American families have been left behind. (Tested with Hispanic voters)

### **HIT Strategies**

- No matter our race or where we come from, what we need at this moment is a government that works for us instead of large corporations, or the wealthy one percent. We need to continue building on the progress that has been made since 2020 to provide over a million hard-working middle class families with \$200 per month subsidies to access affordable health care, \$1,400 per person economic assistance to 66 million families with children and \$20 billion to local state governments to help low-income households pay their rent and utility bills. We must ensure equal access to opportunity for working families. (Tested with AAPI voters)

### **Democracy Corps**

- The Democrats say, in the richest country on the planet, half our people live paycheck to paycheck. That's why we need a government that looks out for the middle class, working families, small businesses, and the vulnerable who work hard. They don't need a government that jumps for the top 1 percent and biggest corporations. Those corporations must pay their fair share so we can invest in education, job creating infrastructure, helping small businesses, childcare, reduced drug and health care costs, and lower taxes for working families. With the gap growing between rich and poor, government should bend over backwards for those who work hard so America can grow the middle class again.
